Our mission is clear: to empower and equip the boy child across Africa with the knowledge and tools needed to grow into responsible and strong-willed men in society. Since our kickoff in 2021, we have been on a journey of transformation, reaching communities across 12 African countries and impacting over 25 Nigerian states.

- We prioritize the boy child, aged 8-20, offering transformative workshops and outreach programs that foster personal growth.
- Simultaneously, we recognize the indispensable role of parents, conducting community sensitization and practical workshops to empower them in nurturing their boy's well-being.
- And also Collabotating with Educationists across Africa

EMPOWERING THE BOY-CHILD (AGES 8-20)

Embarking on a transformative journey, we engage boys aged 8-20 through workshops fostering personal growth. Annually celebrating the International Day of the Boy Child on May 16th, our street and school outreach initiatives connect with boys from diverse backgrounds, creating a space for development, empowerment, and resilience.

SUPPORTING PARENTS

Nestled within communities, TAPA takes the lead in community sensitization programs focused on active parental involvement. Our practical workshops serve as empowering forums, providing parents with the tools and insights needed to nurture their boy's well-being. By fostering open communication, understanding, and a robust foundation for holistic development, we empower parents to play an active and meaningful role in their child's journey toward adulthood.

COLLABORATING WITH EDUCATIONISTS ACROSS AFRICA

At the core of our mission is the championing of holistic boy-child development. Through insightful conferences, we not only provide valuable resources but also collaborate with educators across Africa to shape a positively charged future generation. This collaboration entails sharing knowledge, best practices, and innovative educational approaches.





TAPA achieves its aim through community outreaches and sensitization; intensive workshops; massive awareness through the design of short video clips and Radio jingles about the boy child's growth; and engaging conversations through the mass and social media. Since the project's kick-off in 2021, we have intentionally reached out to many boys in communities across twelve (12) African Countries and more specifically, over 25 Nigerian States by:

- Uniquely commemorating the INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE BOY CHILD and the INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE AFRICAN CHILD (which are respectively celebrated globally on the 16th of May AND 16th of June every year).
- Holding salient conversations with different categories of boys – those in schools and those who live in the streets and communities, who practically lack shelter, care and warmth.
 We selected pilot communities and schools in each State or Country and carried out sensitization programs, informing parents on the need to pay attention to the Boy-child's activities, well-being and growth.
- Planning Model Conferences will be subsequently carried out in many African Countries.
- Running a Boys Model Mentorship Program and inducting the boys who participated in our previous projects into the hall of fame, to have them serve as TAPA Ambassadors and mutate the values learnt and teach their immediate communities why we must groom responsible and strong-willed boys who will become better men in the future.
- Holding insightful conferences on the INTERNATIONAL MEN'S DAY (which is globally celebrated on the 19th of November every year). We have identified and unveiled some model men, thereby providing developmental role models for the future generation of boys.

In 2022 and 2023, we did street vox-pop and also did impactful outreach activities at various schools and communities. We had social media, TV and Radio conversations on the mental health of the boy-child and also encouraged everyone to shine the light to rescue the boys.

Since 2021, we've reached over 12 African countries and impacted 25 Nigerian states. Our approach involves:







INTERNATIONAL DAYS CELEBRATION

- · Marking the International Day of the Boy Child on May 16th.
- Honoring the International Day of the African Child on June 16th
- International Men's day on 19th November

COMMUNITY SENSITIZATION

- Targeted programs in pilot communities and schools.
- Empowering parents to play an active role in their boy's growth

MODEL CONFERENCES

- Future plans for conferences across various African countries
- Ongoing mentorship to shape resilient and responsible young men.
- Inducting achievers into the TAPA Hall of Fame as Ambassadors

OTHER IMPACT

- We have also engaged street/homeless boys in transformative conversations, through outreach and voxpop.
- Involvement in media-wide sensitization programmes to further advocate for the well-being and proper grooming of the Boy-Child.
- Identification, unveiling and celebration of right-living Model Men across several communities.
- Intentional mentorship of boys and their induction as Ambassadors, into the TAPA Hall of Fame.
- We have a volunteer base of over 200 passionate people across Africa, through whose laudable efforts we have been able to, directly and indirectly, influence the proper grooming of boys, numbering in hundreds.
